Thank you for your assistance in improving the quality of meals that we serve. The Faith Covenant Meal program provides lunch and groceries to a wide range of individuals in need. The young and old, the destitute and struggling, are free to take part without cost or red tape.

We have been picking up produce and other products from your Dorchester sight for roughly six months, but we have been receiving donations of surplus produce from your local drop sights for over a year now. It has been over this time period that the number of guests has roughly doubled while the quantity of prepared food which we have depended on has greatly diminished.

All this to say that without the convenience and generosity of Fair Foods, we would spend so much time and resources in acquiring what is needed that there would be little time remaining for actually doing the work of preparing a meal that communicates respect for those we serve.

In a world of hyper-professionalism, and the stratified alienation that it tends to bring, we intend to retain our grass roots, encouraging those who are served and those who serve to exercise their God-given civil duty of compassion, one for the other, as we continue to build and rebuild this country together.
